Freehold possible in township area later this year

The Queensland Government has introduced changes to the Queensland Aboriginal Land Act which will allow land within the Community to be available to be freehold for home ownership and businesses purposes Mayor Wayne Butcher says.

“What this means is that any person Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person living in the Community interested in purchasing the house they live in can submit an expression of interest in making the land freehold and purchasing the property,” Cr Butcher said.

“There will be more information to Community members regarding the changes over the next few months.” He said the changes would not apply to any Aboriginal-owned land. “So it’s not on any Prescribed Body Corporate area or any land trust area, it’s only

Council land,” he said.

“So, on our township area if there’s an individual or a family interested in purchasing a home, they can apply for freehold; they can apply to Council to freehold that block, and then the process begins.”

Most of the Indigenous Mayors and CEOs from throughout Queensland attended, Mayor Wayne Butcher said. “They had a Finance Summit for one day and that was government talking about shared services, so it was about where they can cut costs. “Asset management was a big part of that and Queensland’s Audit Office has been talking to all

Shires generally about weighing up needs against wants. “What’s important – a swimming pool or a road? That’s a ‘want’ against a ‘need’. “And it was also about looking at the whole life of assets. “What’s the whole cost, over its life, of running a swimming pool or a new sporting complex? “The capital to build something

might be only 25 per cent of the actual cost up front, but the whole life is 100 per cent. “On day two we talked about using the media, talking about different types of tools such as Facebook, newsletters, and other things we can use to get to our target audience. “They were the key messages and it was a useful summit.”

“There’s a fair few people involved – the Council, Native Title holders, their representatives at Cape York Land Council and the Department – so they will also be part of any discussions,” Cr Butcher said.

He said home ownership also depended on who can afford it.

“It comes down to affordability and whether financial institutions are going to lend out that kind of money as well,” he said.

Natural Resources and Mines Minister Andrew Powell tabled the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Land (Providing Freehold) and other Legislation Amendment Bill 2014 in Queensland parliament earlier this month.

DAVID Kempton, Member for Cook and Assistant Minister for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs said the legislation was a significant opportunity for all Indigenous Queenslanders that came with a lot of responsibility.

“The initial grant of freehold will be to an indigenous person with interest in the land however there will be no impediment to a subsequent transfer to a non-indigenous person,” he said.

“There may be some risk of subsequent sale to non-community members however this is far outweighed by the huge boost normalisation will bring to economic development and community growth.” Mr Kempton said the legislation would not create freehold but rather provide a mechanism for the community to do adopt it when the timing was right.

It’s been a very sad time in the Community due to the loss of our Elders and family members.

I would like to send my sincere condolence for the loss of our loved ones to close families.

It’s during these sad times that we need to stick together as friends and strengthen our family relationship in our community and move forward with respect for each other.

It’s also on these occasions like this that we need to re-think about our Elders in our Community, and show them the respect that they deserve and learn from them – their knowledge is important and their life experiences not documented enough.

New Houses

The LRASC has six houses (2 x three bedrooms and 4 x four bedrooms) to build in the Community this year, starting in July and finishing in November 2014.

Four houses have tendered out and two will be built by the Council.

The new sub-division will be finished by the end of June 2014, ready for the new houses.

The LRASC will also have seven major housing up-grades and minor renovation program.

Keep Lockhart Beautiful

The LRASC Parks and Garden work team is currently doing a horticulture course which will translate to beautification of the Community park areas.

A new ‘Welcome to Lockhart River’ sign will be erected on the entrance to the Community and landscaping will be part of their training.

We encourage people to clean your house yards and please throw all your rubbish into bins.



Indigenous Minister

Recently I visited Queensland Parliament House in Brisbane and had an opportunity to talk to State Minister for Indigenous Affairs, Hon Glen Elmes MP (DATSIMA).

We discussed the importance of support for Community driven agendas and ideas.

It's critical for Government to support and assist Community driven agendas; Community must lead and drive our own agendas.

Past imposed policies implemented by Government and regional organisation has failed, due to the lack of Community Ownership.

There is a need for change, old ways a norm practise for delivery from top down has failed dramatically.

As leaders in Indigenous Communities across Queensland it's important to lead change, for the betterment of our people.

A great example is our Community Store which is owned and operated by the Queensland Government (DATSIMA).

Indigenous Councils have been approaching Government for nearly twenty years, with their interest in gaining control over their stores for economic and social gain.

Over those years there have been many reports funded by the Government, evaluating current operations and providing options.

All reports came to the same conclusion (in the end Government still owns and operates the stores).

I personally believe that the six stores concerned (Lockhart, Pormpuraaw, Kowanyama, Doomadgee, Woorabinda and Palm Island) must be handed over to Community control.

Communities must have the opportunity to economic development and business ownership.



Queensland Premier

During my visit south I also had a great opportunity to talk to the Qld Premier Hon Campbell Newman MP, highlighting important issues that relates to Lockhart Community.

The Premier was very keen to discuss education, school attendance rates and parents and Community involvement.

I flagged with the Premier the importance of internal strategies, designed and delivered by our people in our community.

The Community must own the school and develop strategies in partnership with, principal, teachers, parents, council and justice group towards better outcomes for our children in general – one cannot operate without the other.

We also discussed existing Government resources and investment and how that must incorporate Community driven agendas and tangible and practical partnerships must be established in the Community to reflect our agendas.

How can the Government and Community work together with current resources to gain greater economic, social and environmental outcomes?

The Premier was very interested in the coming to Lockhart River in the near future and has been formally invited by myself to visit.

Busy times for housing Regis says

Things are busier this year compared to last, Building Supervisor Regis Edmund says.

“A lot of jobs have been done in the community,” he said.

“Most of the seven vacant houses we had have been completed and we are actually in the next stage of that project now.

“We also have some new building to do as part of the new sub-division and that will be two four-bedroom houses.

“We are going to utilise most of our work resources to get that done along with the Council’s carpenter and two subcontractors. We do have a plan in place to utilise a lot of local resources.

“The deadline for building these houses is sometime next year, we’ll know more about that in the weeks to come.”

He said there was other ongoing work as well.

“Apart from the Council work, there is a lot

of maintenance work which is actually up to date now compared to towards this time last year, and a lot has been completed, which is a bonus for the Council,” he said.

“There are other projects Council is keen to put into place this year or in the new financial year.

“We’ll be looking to budget for lights going in down at the Pier, and fixing the radio station, the Kid’s Club and Playgroup.

“There will be funding available next year so we can move on to these projects and look after the Council building and the workshop area.



“Hopefully in future the carpenter will have a proper shed to work from with power because what we have now for him is very limited.

“I would like to say thanks to the people I work with, and everyone who is involved as well as the people of Lockhart themselves to be so cooperative to let us get on with the works we’re doing. People understand we have to come into their house to do those renovations and they have found alternative ways to live.

“Hopefully, we’ll have more houses available for them next year, so we don’t have the same problem we’ve been having this year.”

Jobs creating work for tradies...and Council income...

Housing officer Jasmine Accoom has worked through some big changes over the past six months or so.

“I have been using the Web Portal for at least six or seven months now,” she said.

“It’s really good for keeping track of jobs I’ve generated for

our tradies, and now we are making lots of income for the Council.

“So it is working really good, there have been heaps of jobs coming in for maintenance, most of them in securing their property.

“I’m hope to do some more training in BAS, which is Buildings and Assets.”

With the help of new worker Warren 'Wazza' Canendo, a 12-month plan should see the farm up and running again soon My Pathways Lockhart Regional Manager Mali Ingram says.

“Wazza has been working with the Remote Jobs and Communities Program (RJCP) participants for the past couple of months with a steady crew, sometimes of as many as 20 people,” he said. “A 12 month plan has been written for the farm with the input of the community RJCP participants around what they want to see grown and how it is utilised for training and capacity building.

“The photos relate to the intensive clean up that was needed after the wet season with multiple truck

loads of rubbish taken to the dump. The vision was to see fruit and veg being harvested by the end of the year with hopes of a partnership created between local store to have produce brought and then sold to community reducing freight costs. “A big part of the RJCP contract is giving communities ownership over how activities and training is run and conducted in community.

“Part of that also includes a group of community members working at the Men’s Shelter who have



given the facility a cultural name of ‘Tumpa Ultalucka Nartchi’. Tumpa means food, Ultalucka means Healthy or Strong and Nartchi means place.”

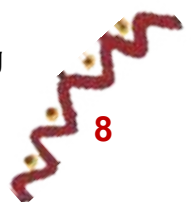

The days are hosted by playgroup workers, Moira, Bettina and Cassie.

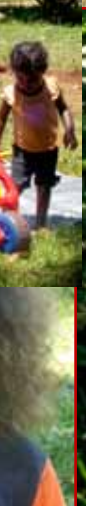
On alternate weeks they do dancing and making juji (grass skirts).

The number of people appearing in Court dropped over the Christmas period, and that always makes Justice Group coordinator Willy Clark very happy.

“Everything seems right,” he said. “The court rate has dropped down a lot, which I’m happy about. I think it’s the wet season, the road’s closed, but I urge people not to travel.

“And young teenagers on their quad bikes and all the rest of it, they need to be careful and listen – respect – their elders when they’re told to do something, and

keep off the roads.

“If there’s an accident there won’t be anyone to blame but themselves, not the police, not anybody else.”

He said he was looking forward to seeing both the Men’s and Women’s group getting up and running.

“We want to see 100% attendance at the school and that takes everyone’s

involvement,” he said. “I’d like to see more activities from community groups, programs every week – fishing competitions, sports down at the beach, prizes. I’d like to see a Family Day every Saturday down at the beach because it was beautiful down there. It’s always good to see families and children down at the beach.”

Men’s Group plan to build on strengths

Lockhart’s Men’s Group has a new coordinator, former-Mayor Rodney Accoom.

Mr Accoom said he has big plans for the group, including designing and carving a new sign for the building and some canoe building.

“If I can get some tools, I’ve got ideas,” he said. “Everyone comes past here, people from the outside, and there’s a small sign that says ‘Men’s Centre’. So if we can get some men together to come up with a design, they can do the carving and there will be a big sign.

“I also want to get some older men involved with the young

fellows, some of them make canoes on the side.

“And do so carving , making spears, taking the group out bush, yarn about bush tucker around campfires.”

Deputy Mayor Cr Norman Bally has changed office space and is now based at the Men’s Shelter – that means the Centre can now be open most days from 9–5.

He said it’s a great opportunity for him to keep an eye on the premises.

“And make sure everything works within my portfolio under the Men’s Group too,” he said.

He said the Health Action Group was also working from the Shelter.

“We are renting out an office space with them so they can deliver men’s



health issues at the centre,” he said.

“And we have a thing with My Pathway, they’re doing leather workshops up at the Men’s Shelter too.

“We’re also planning a wood working workshop, just over the fence, so a lot of our young fellows can go up there if they want to make tables or chairs or fix their car up, do panel beating.

“That’s really been supported by the Government now.”





Language project benefits from pics & Elders' input

Lockhart River's Maintenance of Indigenous Languages and Records (MILR) project is in its final year.

Over the past three years Reverend David Thompson and Clair Hill, working with Lucy Hobson, Elizabeth Giblet, Suzie Pascoe, Dorothy Short and others, have produced many books, language learning CD's and a phone dictionary app. The final project is a book and ebook that celebrates the language, culture and beauty of Lockhart River with beautiful photos and sound and video of people speaking in language

and Lockhart Creole. Tony Bainbridge who had been Electrician in Lockhart for the past couple of years has now gone back to live in Cairns, but he is keeping connected by contributing his Lockhart photos to the project.

He has many beautiful photos of Laura Festival 2013 and some gorgeous dawn shots on Quintel Beach, just to name a few. As many people know, Susanne Stannard, Deputy principal of the school is also a keen



photographer and has taken some stunning photos of Lockhart landscapes and wildlife that she is contributing to the book. The book will include language, Lockhart Creole and English, and an iPad app will be put together with video and sound of the ladies words.

The Puuya Foundation has three new staff in Lockhart River working in Early Years services. Early years services are coming together well working in collaboration to deliver some great programs to Mums and Bubs – Families Together, Playgroup Queensland and Families as First Teachers.

We announced at the last learning circle there was a philanthropist who kindly donated a building for early years to the Puuya Foundation. We are trying to secure additional funds to build and fit-out an early years building.



Former Puuya chairperson Johnson Chippendale proposed a diabetic footwear project as a big need in the community. We have been working with Apunipima and the clinic to make this happen. In May 2014 the project will be launched.

Puuya Foundation is continuing to support the 'Strong Heart Food Gang – Healthy Pizza Project', supported by a community grant from the

Australian Early Development Index (AEDI) Training took place in February with participants from early years services and the Lockhart River State School. TAFE, Sunshine Coast, and Department of Education, Training and Employment were our partners for the training happen which was greatly appreciated by all. One hundred per cent of participants said they got great value from participating.

Young people from Lockhart River attended a series of Indigenous Hip Hop Projects' workshops to explore culture, community and health themes in January this year. They then wrote and performed their track 'Lockhart River Love' for the crew's cameras. Advanced Health Worker in Tobacco and Healthy Lifestyles Gerrald Lasserre said the community enjoyed every minute of the production process and was looking forward to seeing the finished product.

"The project would not have happened without the tremendous support of Indigenous Hip Hop Projects and the Lockhart River community," Mr Lasserre said. "The video captures young people's singing and dancing

talents as well as their messages on smoking, exercise, the importance of culture and their affection for Lockhart River.

"Everyone is extremely excited about seeing the video."

Celebrations in May will take place over three days (16th-18th) and include a Welcome to Country, Traditional Indigenous Games, cultural activities and a disco.

This is a great thing to do to make sure you are as healthy as you can be!!

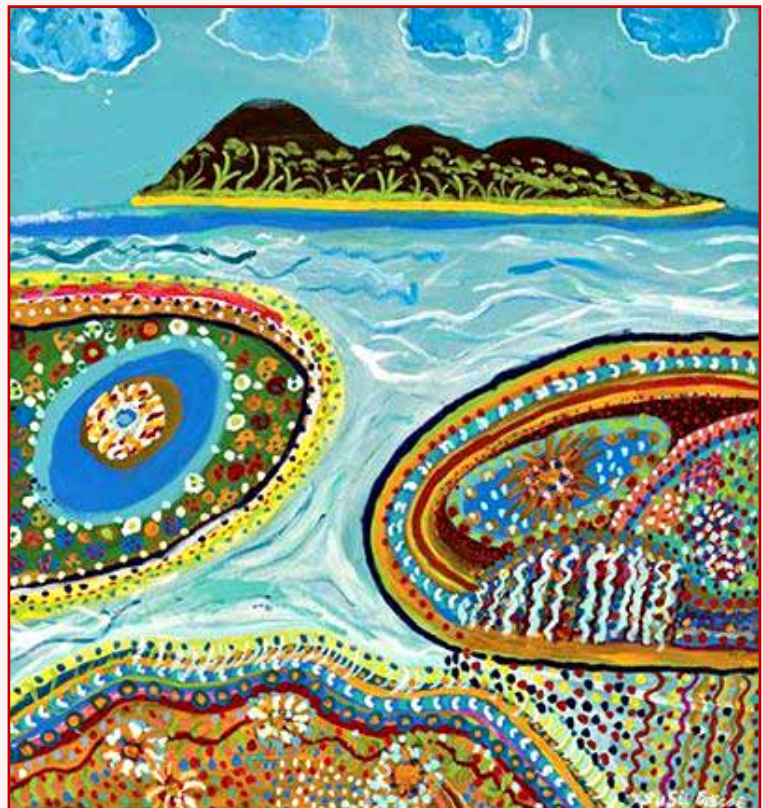
